Francesco Milioto, Conductor



Now in his fifth season as conductor of the Highland Park Strings, Francesco Milioto has established himself as one of this city's most talented and sought-after musicians. The Chicago Tribune has called him "one of the best young conductors working in the Chicago area." In addition to his podium activities, he exercises his prodigious piano skills as a chamber musician, collaborative pianist and vocal coach. Since 2003 Milioto has been engaged as an assistant conductor and regular rehearsal pianist at the Ravinia Festival where this past summer he worked closely with Maestro James Conlon, the CSO and soloists on a production of Puccini's Tosca.

This year he will return to the Los Angeles Opera as assistant conductor to Maestro Patrick Summers to work on Puccini's La Boheme. Milioto also is music director of the Skokie Valley Symphony, and the New Millennium Orchestra, which will be featured at Symphony Center and the Harris Theater during the upcoming season. As artistic director of Access Contemporary Music, he will lead concerts and a tour of Toronto before returning to Opera on the James in Lynchburg, Va., for a production of Donizetti's L'Elisir D'Amore.

Pederzoli and Armbrust are members of the newly-formed Spektral Quartet. Among the great violin-viola duos of the literature is Mozart's glorious Sinfonia Concertante, which is as romantic as it is representative of the 18th Century. Bach's Brandenburg Concerto No. 6, the last of the famous set composed in the style of the concerto grosso, features the mellow voice of two violas in duet as "concertante" soloists contrasted with Bach's exuberant tutti. Haydn's early Symphony No. 59 ("Fire") probably earned its nickname from the extremely energetic first movement with its unusual "Presto" marking. Haydn's unending originality in each of his more than 100 symphonies is legend.

Pederzoli plays a 1717 Carlo Bergonzi violin on generous loan from Francis Akos, Highland Park Strings conductor emeritus and former assistant concertmaster of the Chicago Symphony Orchestra.

Award-winning Canadian violinist Nikki Chooi makes his Strings debut in one of the most difficult concertos in the repertoire and a favorite of concertgoers, especially the beautiful Canzonetta. A student of Ida Kavafian and Joseph Silverstein at the Curtis Institute of Music and recipient of the 2010 Gene Witz Memorial Scholarship at the Ravinia Steans Music Institute, Chooi is a seasoned orchestral soloist and chamber music performer. Tchaikovsky's chamber music is as colorful and Russian in spirit as his symphonic works. Two of these works, the melancholic Andante Cantabile from his First String Quartet based on a folk tune, and "Souvenir de Florence," his celebrated string sextet, are arranged for the larger format of the string orchestra.

Chooi plays on a 1729 Guaneri del Gesu on generous loan from the Canada Council of the Arts Instrument Bank.

The Strings' annual benefit in the intimate and acoustically superb Bennett-Gordon Hall at Ravinia always brings stellar artists to center stage. Soprano Michelle Areyzaga, an alumna of the Ravinia Steans Music Institute is well known in Chicago and abroad for her vocal versatility. In the music of Brazilian composer Villa-Lobos, which marries folk music with the style of J.S. Bach, Areyzaga's artistry has a remarkable vehicle. Israeli cellist and recording artist **Amit Peled**, in his third appearance with the Strings, will perform Victor Herbert's Cello Concerto No. 2, considered the composer's classical masterpiece, although the Irish-born composer-cellist is best known for his operettas and works for the musical theater. It is this concerto that is said to have been the inspiration for Dvorak's Cello Concerto. Close connections continue with Dvorak's Symphony from the "New World," in which the romantic composer juxtaposes indigenous American folk music with the spirit of his native Bohemia.

Stephen Burns, Chicago's multi-talented conductor, trumpet virtuoso, composer and professor, returns to lead the Strings in a classic program with a "now" twist. He also will perform Haydn's brilliant Trumpet Concerto in E-Flat Major and collaborate from the podium with award-winning pianist **Lori Kaufman** in Mozart's C Major Piano Concerto No. 21. Kaufman, who is a major presence on the Chicago musical scene and performed Chopin with the Strings last year, has plans to perform across Southeast Asia during the 2011-2012 season. marks his composing debut with the Strings with his orchestral Serenade featuring **Constance Volk**, principal flute of the New Millennium Orchestra. The three-movement "expression of love" highlights folklore rhythms of Susmano's native Argentina enhanced by the special sound effects of the marimba, large triangle and woodblock. Schubert's enchanting Fifth Symphony known as "The Symphony without Trumpets and Drums," pays homage to Mozart in the warm Andante.
